New Knowledge:

- A continent is a large solid area of land.
- Europe is a continent. We live in Europe.
- Africa is also a continent.
- Oceans are large areas of sea.
- The Indian Ocean is to the East of Africa and the Atlantic Ocean is to the West of Africa.
- England is part of a big island surrounded by seas and the Atlantic Ocean.
- Different places include human features (things made by humans) e.g. house, town, harbour, canal, shop and physical features (things made by nature) e.g. weather, rivers, oceans, mountains, forests.
- Some human and physical features (things) at home in the United Kingdom and away in Africa are the same and some are different (e.g. people, weather, farming, houses, oceans).
- Maps and plans show where places are.
- Maps and plans are views from above or a 'bird's eye' view of a place.
- Maps and plans use symbols to represent things.
- Maps and plans need a title to show what place the map/plan is of.
- A map key is a table that explains what the symbols on the map
