Refugee Migration

New Knowledge:

- Migration is the movement of people from one place to another.
- It has happened all around the world throughout history.
- There has been a continual process of migration into and out of the UK throughout history.
- Since World War II, refugees from many conflicts have come looking for safety in the UK (for example, Ukrainian refugees in 2022).
- In the last half century, other events around the world have pushed even larger numbers of people to flee war and persecution.
- In 2011, a civil war began in Syria, which by 2017 had seen an estimated 2 million refugees flee their home into neighbouring countries.
- The conflict in Syria has now displaced 12 million people, creating the largest wave of refugees to hit Europe since World War II.
- 86 per cent of refugees are cared for by low-income countries (LICs), not high-income countries (HICs).
- Waves of migration have shaped the multicultural society of modern Britain.
- Large humanitarian operations e.g. building shelters/refugee camps for refugees can inadvertently cause deforestation and loss of biodiversity.
