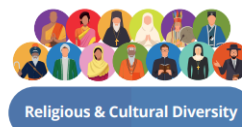
How and why are Allah and Muhammad (PBUH) important to Muslims?

New Knowledge:

- Some people hold Islamic beliefs and practices.
- Those who follow Islam are called Muslims.
- Muslims use different items to support their prayer such as prayer mats and prayer beads.
- Allah sent Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) as the last messenger to teach Islam to everyone.
- Muhammad is very special to Muslims so they say 'peace be upon him' after his name.
- The Muslim scripture is the Holy Qur'an. Muslims believe it is 'the word of God'. It is written in Arabic.
- The Qur'an is really precious to Muslims, so it should be treated with respect.
- When the Qur'an is not being used it will usually be covered and is kept in a safe place – often on a high shelf
- When the Qur'an is being used, it sits on a Qur'an stand.
- Muslims believe that there is only one God, called Allah (the Arabic word for God)
- Muslims only describe Allah – they don't draw him or Muhammad because they are so special and perfect.
- Muslims describe Allah as wise, caring, fair, creator of the world, sends messages to them through his messengers, seeing and knowing everything,
- Allah has 99 names. Prayer beads represent Allah's 99 names e.g. Al Malik The King, Al Khaaliq The Creator, Al Basir The All Seeing.
