Judaism



What do Jews believe about God?



New Knowledge:

- Judaism is the religion of the Jewish people. The symbol or emblem of the Jewish people is the Magen David (Shield of David), also known as the Star of David.
- Jews worship God in a synagogue. Jewish people attend services at the synagogue on Saturdays during Shabbat. Shabbat (the Sabbath) is the most important time of the week for Jews.
- The Torah is the first part of the Jewish bible it contains the first 5 books of the Hebrew Bible and contains rules to help guide a Jew in their life.
- The Torah is read every week in the synagogue, the end of one cycle is celebrated in Simchat Torah.
- Kippah A small round cap traditionally worn by Jewish men so that their heads may be covered. Some wear Kippah during prayers, while others also wear them at all other times.
- Jews believe that there is a single God who not only created the universe, but with whom every Jew can have an individual and personal relationship. They believe that God continues to work in the world, affecting everything that people do.
- Jewish people believe God is: One God, Creator, Sustainer, Eternal, King, powerful
- The Story of Joseph shows how God is looking after Joseph through good and bad times, and that Joseph fulfils God's prophecy / plan.
- Jews believe they have a special agreement with God called a covenant.
 Jews promise to obey God's laws to say thank you to him for looking after them.
- The Torah has 613 commandments which are called mitzvah. They are the rules that Jews try to follow. The most important ones are the Ten Commandments given to Moses.
- When humanists make decisions, they don't follow a written set of rules. Instead, humanists make decisions based on: Experience things you have done and learned from.**
- Jews believe that God is the creator of the world. God cares for all people.
